From the chaplain

Thank you to all who assisted in making the Confirmation and Baptism service a great success last weekend, especially to Leigh-Aire Hall, Deb Harrison, Mrs Deroost and her musicians, the School Captains, and the people of St Mary's.

If you put a buzzard in a six or eight square foot pen which is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of his ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of ten or twelve feet. Without space to run, as is his habit, he will not even attempt to fly, but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top.

The ordinary bat that flies around at night, a remarkable nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat ground, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt, painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off like a flash.

A bumblebee, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top, but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself.



In many ways, there are lots of people like the buzzard, the bat and the bee. They are struggling about with all their problems and frustrations, not realising that the answer is right there above them. As we move from the season of Easter to Pentecost, let us be people who are part of the solution and not the problem.

House System

As our school continues to grow and blossom we have had some need to reshape and reinvent ourselves to keep pace with the evolving needs of our school population. Last year saw us move from a small school system of Pastoral Care, based on homerooms and individual communities within the wider school, to the House system and a vertical structuring of Pastoral Care more suited to larger schools. This year that model has been expanded from three Tutor Groups per House to four. As the School community continues to broaden we have continued to reshape our practice in accordance with systems of care which are aimed at keeping our strong community focus and connection. Throughout this year at GMAS the Heads of House and Executive have been doing a lot of work in finding the best balance for our Pastoral Tutor times and balancing up competing demands.

The result of this thought has been to increase Tutor time and to programme that time in a way that fits with our vision of community, connection and care. This means finding ways to allow for real peer mentoring and connection across year groups, a place for each member of our community in the Pastoral Care of each other, an active hand in corporate worship and time that we can gather as a House, Year and School.

Prior to the beginning of next term we will be moving to order our Tutor time in a way that more fully brings all of these desires and needs together in a simple and effective weekly programme. As a part of this we will be running a series of workshops for those in Years 7—10 following the upcoming examinations.

We will still use the Tutor time for Chapel, Assembly and House meetings but will begin to programme in some time as year groups as well as running a coordinated pastoral course aimed at the retention of positive values as well as expanding a coordinated system of activities within House and Tutor groups.

These changes will not alter the current timetable nor Tutor groupings.

The major changes will be:

- Chapel being separated from Assembly so that Chapel will be run in smaller groups comprised of two Houses. Each



member of the community will still be at Chapel once a week but in more intimate groupings.

- Assembly will remain on Wednesdays and involve the whole Secondary School giving us time and space to attend to issues pertaining to the whole Secondary School and to celebrate student achievements.
- A single Pastoral Care curriculum delivered through Tutor Groups once a week based on the Positive Schools programme which allows us to be pro-active to our community's development.
- Some of the weekly House Meetings will be reallocated as Year Group Meetings at strategic points of the year.
- House and Tutor activities will be a part of the larger integrated Pastoral Care programme and will be run weekly.

While these changes will have no impact on the wider timetable they will significantly increase our ability to provide a more integrated Pastoral Care system that nurtures student leadership and community. Further to this it allows us to maintain the community feel of the School while catering to an increasingly complex need to bring groups together and respond to the differing need of each of the groups in our school.

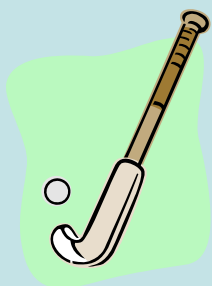

Road safety Tips for Parents

- Talk about and practice the correct way to cross the road with your child
- Always drop off or pick up your child on the same side they leave or arrive on. This way, your child will not need to cross the road unaccompanied.
- Young children have limited peripheral vision. Teach them to turn their heads properly and look in each direction before crossing the road
- Alert your child to the dangers of distractions. Listening to musical devices loudly or playing around with friends can often mean they are not focused on their environment. Remind them to turn their music down and keep their games for the school grounds. Remind your child vehicles take time to stop. Never gamble on beating an oncoming vehicle. Play 'The Breaking Game' <http://www.ors.wa.gov.au/uhtml/thisSite/youthroadsafety/games.html> to test your child's knowledge of stopping distances for cars.
- Most importantly, remind your child they are precious to you and many others

Human Swine Influenza Policy & Procedure

1. Introduction and Purpose of the Policy

Human Swine Flu (HSI) is a strain of the influenza virus that usually affects pigs, but which may also make people sick. HSI is an illness that causes symptoms similar to those of the regular human seasonal flu. Symptoms include a fever, nasal congestion, sore throat, cough and aches.

The purpose of this Policy is to set out how the School will minimise the exposure of students and staff and the broader community to HSI.

2. Scope of the Policy

This Policy applies to all staff and students of Georgiana Molloy Anglican School including tutors and casual employees.

3. Exclusion Practice and Notification of Overseas Travel

To limit the potential exposure of HSI the School has decided to adopt a student and staff exclusion practice to minimise the exposure risk for the School community. This exclusion practice requires students and staff returning, or arriving, from certain countries affected by HSI to remain at home for seven days (the maximum incubation period) before returning to the School.

The exclusion policy allows time for any illness related to travel, including HSI, to develop, and for prompt medical assessment and treatment to commence. If the student or staff member remains well for the seven day exclusion period they may then return to the School.

4. Who the Exclusion Practice Will Apply to

The exclusion practice will only apply to students and staff who have travelled to or are arriving from countries that have had community or school transmission of HSI. Currently the countries with community or school transmission are Mexico, USA, Canada, Japan and Panama. This list is subject to change, based on advice from government agencies. Should additional countries be identified as having community or school transmission the School will notify parents via email.

5. School of Interest

Human Swine Influenza is a notifiable disease. A confirmed case of HSI in a student or staff member who has attended the School whilst infectious will result in the School being identified as a 'school of interest'.

WA Health will investigate each HSI case and then make a decision on how to proceed based on the level of exposure and likely affect on other individuals. WA Health may decide to place those with immediate contact with the infected person into home isolation and provide them with an antiviral treatment. Alternatively WA Health may decide on a partial (e.g. only the infected persons class or year), or complete closure of the School. The decision to close the School would not be made lightly and full consideration would be given to the social support issues an unexpected closure may create for some families.

Cooperation with the School policy and WA Health guidelines and decisions is important for public health and safety. The primary objective of the School and WA Health is to delay and limit the spread of HSI within the broader community.

6. Standard Hygiene Practice

All students and staff should continue good hygiene practices to minimise the spread of all infections, including HSI. The following practices will assist in reducing the spread of all infections during the influenza season;

- Cover your mouth and nose if you cough or sneeze
- Washing your hands after contact with soiled tissues or any contact with nose or throat discharge
- Stay at home and seek medical attention you feel unwell.
