From the Principal

This week I had the honour of being a small part of the State Funeral at St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney of Professor Chris O'Brien. I knew Chris as a dad of two boys whom I taught and as a doctor who joined me on an international music tour. I had the honour of assisting with the composition of the funeral service, including the music and conducting the 150 strong choir, many of whom are now old boys who regrouped for this special celebration. To many thousands who attended the funeral Chris was the famous head and neck cancer specialist and the star of the famed TV hospital series RPA who had extraordinary skills as a surgeon. Hearing the eloquent six eulogies was humbling. Chris was a charismatic, gifted, yet humble man. To me he was simply a man for others, a symbol of our motto, *Rejoice in Service*.

It was in his final two and half years, while coping with this insidious brain tumour, that his drive for improved cancer treatment lead to the commitment to the realisation of his dreams to have a hospital that would be dedicated to cancer research and improved treatment for cancer sufferers. Prime Minister Kevin Rudd had already committed \$100 million to the project, The Life Hospital, and today Mr Rudd extended that commitment to \$150 million and at the wake announced the hospital to be renamed as the Chris O'Brien Life House Hospital. It is not possible for all to be in the league of a Chris O'Brien, however I do ask our students, what is your drive, your passion towards excellence, even in the time of adversity that is for more than ourselves?

At the wake I took the opportunity to speak with Mr Rudd and raised a number of matters with him. I spoke with passion of GMAS and our needs as a growing school and expressed my thanks for his commitment to educational reform. Politics aside, there is no doubt that our wonderful school has benefited greatly by the Federal Government's education agenda through computers, the building of the Multipurpose Hall and the three outdoor multipurpose courts and water tanks. I told him that this week we turned the soil for the multipurpose courts and that we will turn the soil of the Multipurpose Hall in the next two weeks. He congratulated us on our drive and initiative to achieve so much in such a short period of time. I am sure that you all agree we have indeed done remarkably well and there is much more to do.

This week I wrote to all Year 9 parents concerning swine flu and the intended tour to **Canberra**. There has been much in the press on the matter and, though there is no advice from health agencies that the tour should be cancelled, I felt it was important to give the parents the option to attend Canberra. I will be able to report the parent response next week.

The **Junior School Musical** for 2009 will be *Oliver*. I will begin auditioning students in Years 3 – 6, and perhaps even Year 2, early next week. I would expect that there will be many students to audition and I would welcome a large cast so begin warming the vocal chords over the weekend.

Subject Information Evenings

Year 10 2010—A subject information evening will be held on Monday 15 June for current Year 9 students and their parents. This will commence at 6.00pm in the Resource Centre. This will be an overview of the Year 10 curriculum offered in 2010.

Year 11 2010—A subject information evening will be held on Thursday 18 June for current Year 10 students and their parents. This will commence at 7.00pm in the Resource Centre. This will be an overview of the Year 11 curriculum offered in 2010.

Non Attendance at Senior School Examinations

Students and parents are advised that students non attendance at examinations follows the Curriculum Council guidelines. These are available at curriculumcouncil.wa.edu.au. The School assessment policy in relation to non attendance at examinations is available in the student handbook.

Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) - Change of Name

Since the late 1990s each state (except Queensland) has used a common measure to rank Year 12 students for university admission. In each state this measure has had different names:

- TER (Tertiary Entrance Rank) in Western Australia, Northern Territory, South Australia and Tasmania
- UAI (Universities Admission Index) in New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory
- ENTER (Equivalent National Tertiary Entrance Rank) in Victoria

The Australasian Conference of Tertiary Admissions Centres (ACTAC), of which TISC is a member, has agreed that all states and territories (except Queensland) will replace these different names with a common name, the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR), during 2009 and 2010.

In Western Australia, the public universities have agreed that there will be a phased introduction of the name change over this period. The term TER will be replaced with the term TER (ATAR) in 2009 and ATAR in 2010. This will be reflected in students' Year 12 results published by TISC at the end of the year, in TISC publications and on the TISC website. This is a name change only, and will have no effect on students' ranking or the selection process for university.

The adoption by all states and territories (except Queensland) of the name Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) over the 2009 and 2010 period merely reinforces that the measures of overall achievement of Year 12 students in these states are the same.

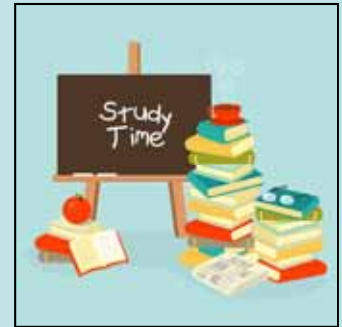

From the Head of Secondary School

Today's generation of school children are tested more than any other generation. In turn, many students feel the pressure of tests and exams and can show signs of stress. When you're getting a bit stressed about an exam, it just means that you really care about the result you will get. That can be a good thing if it pushes you into working extra hard as you try to get a good score. But it can be bad if you get too worried and the effects of the stress stop you doing well.

When exams get too much, the stress can show in your body and you could be showing signs of stress if you're:

- feeling tired
- ache all over
- cry and feel sad
- have panic attacks
- have broken sleep
- suffer from stomach upsets
- have itchy skin rashes
- more likely to get colds or flu



Tips for helping with stress:

1. **Get plenty of sleep:** Try to keep your sleep routine as regular as possible.
2. **Take a break:** This is really important. You should give yourself plenty of short breaks as you revise. This keeps you fresher for longer, so you will learn more.
3. **Time for yourself:** Try to leave enough time in your revision for some fun. You will need to put your books down and do something you enjoy for a while if you want to stay in a good mood.
4. **Be realistic:** Don't try to do too much work each day. If you overdo it you won't take in the facts you're revising.
5. **Eat properly:** Make sure your diet includes plenty of fruit and veg. Drink juice or water, and avoid too much tea or coffee.
6. **Get some exercise:** It's a fantastic stress buster. Go running, skateboarding, play a sport, or just take a walk around the block. You will feel more relaxed. If you're not sleeping very well exercise can make a real difference.
7. **Be positive:** Don't beat yourself up about things, instead be nice to yourself. Make a quick list of five things you've done that you are proud of. This will put you in a good mood and you will learn more.
8. **Try to relax:** Breathe deeply. Tell yourself how well you are doing. Remind yourself that everything is going to turn out alright. Stand up straight and smile. You will feel a bit better straight away.

Try your best, but if you don't do as well as you hoped, it's not the end of the world. You'll have plenty of chances in the future to prove yourself.

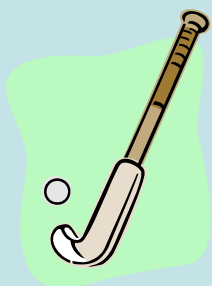
